Objectives

The Université Paris Cité offers a **unique VBHC Graduate Program** to help pragmatic leaders make high-value care a reality. This hybrid training program includes VBHC concepts, **implementation methods**, **use cases**, **immersion visits** and outstanding **networking opportunities**. Each year, from July to December, a **small group of participants** interacts with **world-class experts** and **mentors** around a series of operational challenges:

- ✓ Mobilize internal resources around a standardized value agenda;
- Build a community of practice with iterative improvement loops;
- Make outcome data independent, insightful and actionable;
- ✓ Involve patients in shared decision-making;
- ✓ **Transform** care pathways with patient case-mix adjustment;
- ✓ Incentivize high-value care with interplay of remuneration & reputation;
- ✓ **Purchase** devices and drugs through value-based procurement.

Pioneering Value-Based Health Care is essentially about **leadership**. This six-month part-time graduate program is an outstanding learning opportunity to **challenge yourself**, meet other talents, and stimulate your mind. All in one semester.

Practical information

Organization

- ✓ Five training modules totaling 10 days from July to December
- ✓ Two days of training per month (6 working days over 6 months)
- ✓ Half the sessions are face-to-face, the other half are online
- ✓ Two immersion visits are organized in Rotterdam & Boston (optional)
- ✓ Graduation requires full attendance

Tuition

- ✓ €6,000 (tax included) per participant
- ✓ 50% discount for non-profit organizations, PhD candidates, residents, patient representatives
- ✓ This rate includes training sessions, course-pack, ICHOM conference registration and lunches
- ✓ Tuition does not include the registration fee (€300) and travel expenses (transportation, lodging, other meals).

Evaluation & Graduation

The VBHC Graduate Program delivers a **University diploma based on an evaluation process** assessing each participant's theoretical and practical learnings on VBHC. This evaluation process includes written and oral assignments:

- *Executive summary* capturing the key learnings from the immersion visits in the Netherlands or Boston;
- ✓ *Class participation:* attendance & quality interactions with mentors, lecturers & other participants;
- ✓ Implementation report on a VBHC pilot (e.g., pathway map, TDABC, PROM selection, etc.);
- ✓ Poster defense before a jury presenting an action plan to implement the VBHC pilot.

Each of these evaluations weighs 25% of the final grade. Graduation requires a final grade of 10/20 (*Cum laude* from 13/20 to 14/20; *Magna cum laude* from 15/20 to 16/20; *Summa cum laude* from 17/20 to 20/20).

1. Executive summary following immersion visits (25% of the final grade)

Each participant returns a one-page executive summary capturing the key learnings of the immersion visit to the Netherlands *or* the Boston conference. The objective is to hone the participant's judgment on various VBHC cases in different organizations. Evaluation criteria include the participant's capacity to identify creative solutions to overcome organizational failures on different levels (cultural, technical, medical, financial, political, etc.). The executive summary must be returned (i) before September 12, 2022, for the Dutch learning expedition (9.00 am) or (ii) before November 14, 2022, for the ICHOM conference (9.00 am).

2. Class participation (25% of the final grade)

Class interaction is essential for group cohesion and learning dynamics. Attendance and punctuality are required for each session as a mark of respect for faculty and other participants. Sick leave must be justified with a medical certificate. Unjustified absences (non-medical) are penalized (10% penalty on the final grade for half a day absence, 20% for a full day). Beyond this limit, participants are no longer eligible for graduation. Late arrival and early departure (more than 15') are considered an absence for half a day. Face-to-face sessions require physical presence, not online participation. The ICHOM conference in Boston is the only session where the participant is free to attend face-to-face or online. If an absence incurs booking expenses (trip, dinner, tuition, etc.), the participant will reimburse the cancellation fee to the University.

3. Implementation report on a VBHC pilot (25% of the final grade)

From July to November, each participant prepares a report on implementing a VBHC pilot on a specific condition and organization (10 pages). A mentor provides theoretical and practical guidance for five months through a series of mentor-participant monthly meetings, in tandem with another participant focusing on a distinct VBHC pilot. These team meetings (two participants and one mentor) work as a creativity incubator for cross-fertilizing pragmatic solutions and mobilizing VBHC tools for implementation. Evaluation criteria include analytical skills, change management, and a realistic action plan. The implementation report must be returned before November 30, 2022 (Wednesday, 9.00 am).

4. **Poster defense before a jury** (25% of the final grade)

Each participant captures in a one-page poster the essence of the ten pages implementation report. The poster must be returned before December 7, 2022 (9.00 am). This poster is presented and discussed during 20' with a jury of VBHC experts on December 17, 2022. Each participant attends the entire session. Each mentor schedules a training session in December with participants. Evaluation criteria include the quality of the oral presentation and discussion with the jury.
